Picioli and her team of eight audiologists and five speech-language pathologists work with individuals from college-age students through retirees to provide hearing evaluations, consultations, hearing aid trials and programming, cochlear implant mapping and upgrades, assistive technology and accessory fittings, and more.

Dr. Gregory Horton, Au.D., CCC-A is board certified with the American Speech and Hearing Association and is a licensed hearing aid dispenser in the State of New York. In addition to diagnosing hearing loss and guiding patients through the selection, fitting, and adjustment process of wearing hearing aids, Dr. Horton is one of the only audiologists in upstate NY who has received specialized training in hearing conservation for musicians and individuals working in the entertainment industry. As a musician himself, he recognizes the importance of hearing conservation and uses evidence, counseling, education, and technology to empower musicians to take ownership of their hearing health.

2026 Community Person Award

Dr. John McNamara, Au.D., is a prominent audiologist in Rochester, New York, recognized for his decades of clinical excellence and his profound commitment to humanitarian service. Throughout his career, he has bridged the gap between advanced auditory technology and the human need for connection, both in his local community and across the globe.



Dr. McNamara's foundation in communication sciences began at SUNY Geneseo, where he earned his Bachelor's in Speech Pathology in 1982 and a Master's in Audiology in 1983. He later achieved his Doctor of Audiology from A.T. Still University of Health Sciences in 2006.

His early professional years were marked by a dedication to complex hearing needs: He interned at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf (RIT) and taught at Gallaudet University's Model Secondary School for the Deaf. Afterwards, he moved to Brooklyn and established an audiology department at a major geriatric facility. He returned to Rochester to teach at NTID and then joined the practice he renamed to Ontario Hearing Centers when he bought it.

We selected Dr. McNamara for the Community Person Award, not only for his service to the Rochester community, but to the world.

Dr. McNamara's work extends far beyond our community through his partnership with the Entheos Audiology Cooperative and the Hearing the Call nonprofit. He has been a leader in international "hearing missions," bringing state-of-the-art diagnostic equipment and personalized care to underserved regions.

Dr. McNamara has focused significant efforts on Zambia, a country that historically has had a critical shortage of audiologists. His work there is not merely about providing hearing aids but about building sustainable infrastructure. He has been a key figure in the capital campaign to raise a permanent hearing healthcare clinic in Zambia. This facility aims to treat patients and, crucially, to train local healthcare workers to ensure long-term care.

By restoring hearing to children in rural Zambia, Dr. McNamara's missions have enabled countless students to return to school, as hearing loss is often a barrier to education in these regions.

Additionally, his service to the community is noteworthy. One of his most significant local achievements is

the coordination of the Hearing Aid Donation Program. Through Ontario Hearing Centers, he facilitates the collection of used hearing aids, which are subsequently cleaned, repaired, and distributed to individuals in need in collaboration with organizations such as the Lions Club.

Dr. McNamara is a tireless advocate for those with hearing loss. He is deeply involved with the Hearing Loss Association of America Rochester Chapter, where he serves on the Professional Advisory Committee. He has been an HLAA Rochester Chapter program speaker whenever we ask him, including workshops at the LifeSpan Day of Hearing. He has a gentle way of determining if anyone had a hearing loss, but is never being "pushy" about purchasing a hearing aid. He has always been willing to advertise in our chapter newsletter, and has reviewed our more technical newsletter articles for accuracy. And he has offered to stay involved with the chapter even after his retirement to Arizona.

For all of these contributions to our community and the global community, we present the Community Person Award to Dr. John McNamara.

Our Once-a-Semester Field Trip

Demo Center volunteers cast out to college students to keep them in the loop!

If you're on the mailing list for this newsletter, then it's likely you have read about the volunteer work of the HLAA-Rochester Tech Team. If you're like me, you are impressed by the display they set out once a month at the Demo Center. The array of devices, selected by the team, exists so members of the public can try out alerting and communication devices at no cost.

Semesterly Field Trip: Since Fall 2023, volunteers from HLAA-Roc have welcomed to the Demo Center students from the aural rehabilitation class I teach in fall and spring semesters at Nazareth University. Before my syllabus is finalized in August and January, I email members of the Tech Team. We develop a plan to make the most of the students' hour-long visit.

On the day of the field trip, volunteers from the Tech Team graciously give students' hands-on demonstrations with devices on display. Students have listened through a loop system and most recently Auracast, which gives them firsthand experience outside the bounds of a classroom. Just as importantly, students can learn from and ask questions to the volunteers about their lived experiences and support network they have through HLAA-Rochester Chapter.

Student Feedback: After the field trip, students always give favorable responses. Many have commented that they were surprised to learn that the HLAA - Rochester Demo Center is only one of two in the country. Others have said that they will encourage friends and families to visit the Demo Center now that they know it exists. In November 2025, student Peyton Buell reflected on her experience, expressing that she appreciated the time a volunteer took showing her how to navigate the chapter's website. Another student, Faith Bennett, said that the volunteers made her visit engaging and educational. Based on student feedback, the semesterly field trip to the Demo Center has positively contributed to their educational journeys.

Introducing David Scott, PAC Member

David Clarence Scott was born and raised in the Rochester, New York area. He returned to his hometown to



serve as the Chief Diversity Officer for Monroe County in March 2023. Prior to his return home, Mr. Scott notably served as the director of diversity and inclusion at Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center for 12 years. Dedicated to building an increasingly diverse workforce, Roswell

Park had exceeded both internal and external goals for workplace and supplier diversity and inclusion under his leadership.

When Mr. Scott was in the 9th grade his left eardrum ruptured during a flight when he was returning home from a family vacation. As a result, he lost 25% of his hearing in his left ear. His father has significant hearing loss since 2020, he depends on hearing aids at this time. Mr. Scott initially got a Bachelor of Arts in economics from the State University of New York at Potsdam in 1995. Subsequently, he began his career with Chase Manhattan Bank, working in home equity sales in 1996. He later excelled in several positions at Bryant & Stratton College, including as an adjunct instructor for 6 years, a career services representative from 1998 to 2000, and a financial services counselor from 1997 to 1998. In 2004, Mr. Scott flourished as a human resources generalist for Universal Healthcare, An Excelsus Company, and a placement supervisor for Burns Personnel.

The recipient of many awards and accolades, Mr. Scott lives by the motto, "Make every moment count towards something good." The son of a reverend and a human resources leader, Mr. Scott's observation of his parents throughout his youth influenced his decision to seek a career in his chosen field. Looking toward the future, he hopes to continue building his career and legacy with Monroe County.

Android Live Caption

In 2026, accessibility is a digital right. Android's Live Caption uses on-device deep learning to transcribe any audio—from podcasts to phone calls—into real-time text. Unlike traditional subtitles, this AI-driven tool requires no pre-existing files, bridging the communication gap for the deaf and hard of hearing. Because it is onboard only, it is acceptable for use in health care settings.

AVAILABILITY & SETUP

Live Caption is standard on Google Pixel (4–10) and Samsung Galaxy (S21–S26) series. To enable it:

Settings: Go to Accessibility > Live Caption and toggle On.

Shortcut: Press the Volume button and tap the Caption icon below the slider.

HEALTHCARE IMPACT

This technology is revolutionizing medical environments through:

Patient Autonomy: Patients can follow telehealth or specialist calls with a real-time text backup, ensuring medical instructions are never missed.

Privacy: Because transcription occurs entirely on-device, no audio data is sent to the cloud, maintaining strict patient confidentiality.

Accuracy: Clinicians in loud settings can use captions as a "second set of ears" to confirm details during consultations.

By turning sound into sight, Live Caption ensures that critical health information remains clear, private, and accessible to everyone.

EXAMPLES OF DIFFERENT CONFIGURATIONS OF HEARING LOSS

Excerpted from Chapter 5 of "HEARING, HEARING LOSS AND HEARING AIDS; A Primer and Handbook for Consumers," A book in progress, by Joe Kozelsky, Audiologist

These examples may not be the same as they appear in the book.

Below are examples of different configurations of hearing loss as seen in practice. These are taken of patients whose last names started with the letter B.

It is easy to see that hearing losses come in a wide range of configurations. The easiest to work with is Figure 1 which is a "flat" configuration.

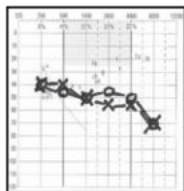

Figure 2 illustrates one of the most difficult, a very sharply falling configuration with no testable hearing in the high tones as indicated by the arrows. The only range of hearing that is aidable is in the narrow range of mid-frequencies. These patients are rarely satisfied with their outcome. However, often the family notices an improvement more than the person with the hearing loss.

Figure 3 is a "Cookie Bite" configuration. These are not too common, but also not rare. Persons with cookie bite configurations frequently do well because the critical high frequencies are still present.

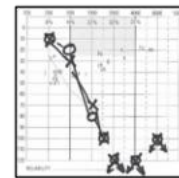

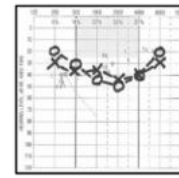

Another difficult configuration is exemplified by Figure 4. This is what I term a "Sawtooth" configuration. In this example only one sawtooth is seen, but on rare occasions there can be two teeth. The problem is obvious. In order to address the deficit at 2,000 Hz, the other frequencies can be too loud. It can be difficult to find a happy medium.

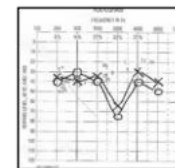

Figure 5 shows an example of a very difficult asymmetrical hearing loss with poorer hearing in the high frequencies for both ears. It is likely that aided hearing would always lateralize to the better ear.

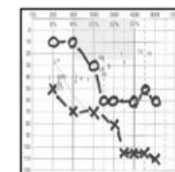

Dan Brooks Interviewed by *Consumer Reports* About Hearing Loops and Auracast

We were excited to learn that our own member, *Dan Brooks*, was interviewed by *Consumer Reports* for their article "It's One of the Best Hearing Aid Features. Many Still Aren't Using It".

He said that currently hearing loops are the preferred method for many people with hearing aids; they don't have to tell anyone they have hearing loss - just sit and hit a button. "As long as it's on and people speak into the mic, it works really nice."

About Auracast, he says it will have some advantages. For one thing, it will be a lot simpler and easier for venues to install it, since it doesn't require the placement of a wired loop and will be accessible to hearing people using a receiver.

Open-caption screenings run on Thursdays and the first Sunday matinees when available (some films lack OC versions). Open-caption showtimes are listed at thelittle.org and on social media.

Robert F. Panara Theater, named in honor of RIT's first Deaf professor and founder of the NTID Drama Club, has a rich heritage of offering challenging, entertaining, and provocative works of theater, all created for both Deaf and hearing audiences. GEVA Theatre Center - Open Captioning for patrons with hearing loss is provided during the 1st Saturday matinee and both performances of the final Wednesday of each Wilson Stage Series production, and the first Saturday matinee of each Fielding Stage Series production. When booking your seats, mention your interest in open captioning in order to secure the most advantageous view of the display on the right of the stage.



RBTL Live Theater - Open Captioning, provided by HLAA, is available for most 1 pm Sunday matinee Broadway subscription shows and select additional performances. A text display scrolls dialogue and lyrics in real time. The auditorium is Auracast enabled. Reserve caption-view seating or request captioning for other events at 585-222-5000 or mail@rbtl.org.

Roc Cinema has a hearing loop and some Saturday matinee movies are open-captioned.

OFC Creations Theatre at Winton Place has an FM system and receivers with hearing loops for T-coils.

Other Theaters - Regal Theatres, Cinemark Theaters, AMC Theaters, and Movie 10 all indicate on their websites that they have closed captioning devices available by asking at the box office. The Strand Theater in Brockport, has individual displays on goosenecks available.
