HEARING AIDS AND NOISE: A Visual Explanation of the Challenges and Some Solutions - James Feuerstein, Ph.D., CCC/A

Hearing aid users often find that they hear well in quiet but continue to struggle in background noise. Using visual examples, Dr. Feuerstein explains hearing and speech acoustics, demonstrating the impact of hearing loss on the ability to understand speech in quiet and noise. He then visually demonstrates how hearing aids attempt to restore speech intelligibility and how advanced technologies and assistive technologies can improve the ability to hear in noise.

EMPLOYMENT HELP THROUGH ACCES-VR - Julia Rood, MS

Adult Career and Continuing Education Services-Vocational Rehabilitation is the agency (you've probably never heard of) which provides a full range of employment services needed by persons with disabilities throughout their lives. ACCES's vocational rehabilitation is targeted toward workingage individuals with disabilities to prepare for, find, and keep employment.

Senior Vocational Transition Counselor, Julia Rood explains procedures for contacting ACCES and their programs designed to help people with hearing loss either seeking employment or currently working. She notes that they cover the cost of hearing aids for job seekers and/or workers.

Ms. Rood has worked at ACCES-VR for over twenty years. She specializes in transition services for youth and is a "fierce advocate of self-advocacy and accessibility for people with disabilities."

WHITE NOISE THERAPY FOR TINNITUS RELIEF SHOULD BE AVOIDED

Tinnitus is a widespread problem with about 20 million Americans suffering from bothersome reactions to it. Although there are a few scientifically-validated therapies for many types of tinnitus, patients are apt to try various types of OTC solutions, (products with white noise masking).

An August 30 JAMA-Otolaryngology report indicates white noise therapy for tinnitus relief should be avoided. According to the researchers, white noise exposure engages anatomical and neurochemical plastic changes in a way that induces maladaptive changes in the brain that degrade neurological health and compromise cognition.

At the core of their analysis, the researchers surmise that both tinnitus and white noise accelerate the aging process of the brain. Accordingly, the authors say the mechanisms commonly associated with hearing loss and tinnitus reflect cortical damage throughout the central auditory pathway and these same changes occur to the brain by exposure to unstructured white noise, even at non-traumatic levels in the adult nervous system.

Given these findings, individuals with bothersome tinnitus should use caution when using unstructured white noise therapy and are best served by seeking an evaluation with an appropriately licensed professional.

HEARING OTHER PEOPLE'S EXPERIENCES

One of the topics that often comes up in the HOPE sessions is what are my thoughts on the "Tru

Hearing" plan. As I understand it, the Tru Hearing Plan provides coverage for a very limited array of hearing aids some, or most, of which would not be the first-line instrument of choice for most providers. Additionally, this benefit includes a very limited number of follow-up visits (only two or three), forcing providers to enter into a fee-for-service model for additional visits should adjustments be needed or problems occur. Since the cost of running the office must be included in follow-up visit fees, it can be more than patients feel they want to pay, which in turn, can discourage follow-up by users.

Over the years, I have developed a listing of over 30 different issues that can interfere with successful hearing aid use. Unfortunately, many persons approaching hearing aids for the first time may be unaware of the complexities involved and the many potential difficulties that could be encountered and, therefore, it is a gamble to take advantage of plans which contain limited follow up provisions and a limited selection of hearing aid makes and models.

"MY STORY" – A Personal History of Hearing Loss By Lorin Gallistel



Judy and I were born and raised in Wisconsin. We also lived in Illinois for 12 years before moving to Rochester in 1985. Neither of us had hearing issues then--and Judy's hearing is

still excellent. I started having a problem understanding some words during meetings in noisy settings about 25 years ago but the loss was so slight that I did not give it a second thought and just assumed that nobody else could hear well in noise either.

Whether the loss progressed slowly or accelerated at some point I don't know but in 2012, when I was 65, I went for a hearing evaluation. The Audiologist said that I had a slight high-frequency hearing loss and might benefit from hearing aids but that I might get along without them as well; I deferred.

By 2015, I was understanding speech less and less, whether in a noisy environment, watching TV, or just in normal conversation. I have somewhat reluctantly been wearing hearing aids since that time. I guess my biggest problem with them is that I remember how good music can sound and I miss that.

In 2017 I first became aware of HLAA from an article in the D&C and attended a meeting out of curiosity. I was so impressed with the people and the well-organized and managed meetings that I joined right away. The meeting included a demonstration of a few Assistive Listening Devices. That impressed me as well, so I also joined the Technology Committee at that time.

What has always driven me is a need to understand details of how things work and a strong interest in solving problems, both of which led me to study engineering in college. A few years after graduating and working as an Electrical Engineer I returned to school to study Operation Research, which I used mainly to supplement to my EE background.

I mention my studies because that explains why the Technology Committee is so interesting to me. The pace of advancement in electronics and computing technology is increasing and each year we see significant improvements in hearing technology, both in software and hardware. I try to stay aware of developments, being motivated by a couple of things. One is my selfish interest in learning how to improve my own hearing. The other is the great satisfaction I get through interacting with other chapter members as well as occasionally being able to help someone else. That is a real joy!

Some food for thought... Communication specialists have observed that people have become so dependent on computers and cell phones that we have neglected, or even lost, the art of conversation...of actually talking to one another.

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
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
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
