Ms. Kelley will speak at both the 11:00am and 7:00pm HLAA meetings. Both meetings take place in the Parish Hall at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Rochester (14607). Free and open to the public, her talks begin at noon and 8:00pm following social time and a brief business meeting.

Barbara Kelley was hired by Self Help for Hard of Hearing (now HLAA) founder Rocky Stone in 1988. She was the editor of *Hearing Loss Magazine* and its predecessor, SHHH Journal, until her appointment as executive director this March. She was the HLAA deputy executive director from 2008 until 2016.

The 1988 SHHH Convention held in Rochester was the first she attended. It was overwhelming, she recalls, as she experienced firsthand meeting others with hearing loss in a hearing-friendly gathering where it was okay not to hear well.

Ms. Kelley says: "It has been my life's work to contribute to the mission of HLAA. It's been exciting to be part of an organization that has had so much influence on public policy such as passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 to most recently sponsoring the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine (NAS) report on Affordable and Accessible Hearing Health Care for Adults. " The Academies' report emphasizes that hearing loss is a significant public health and societal concern. Hearing is vital to communication, health, function and quality of life, they state.

Welcome!

It is with great pleasure that I am writing to introduce myself as your Chapter President for 2016-17 and I

look forward to the challenges ahead. Having served actively on numerous committees and the Board of Directors for HLAA-Rochester since 2013, I know how much work there is to be done at both the local and national levels to improve the quality of life for people with hearing loss and their families.

The year 2016 was significant in many ways: the DOW and the S&P 500 reached historical highs, a woman was nominated as the Presidential candidate for a major party in the U.S., and hearing loss has been officially identified as a significant worldwide health concern.

On June 2, 2016 the American National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine (the Academies) released a report stating that (and supporting why) hearing loss should no longer be regarded as an 'individual' problem, but instead must be addressed on multiple levels of society including health-care communities, nonprofit organizations, industries and government to list a few. This signals that a path to accessible and affordable hearing health care is being paved and you should know that HLAA--'the Nations Voice for People with Hearing Loss' was the only consumer-focused group to contribute financially to this research. We should be very proud to represent such a commitment.

So now a little about me... a native to suburban Rochester, went off to college and life after high school circling back to Rochester on my way to work for an agricultural experimental station in Lusaka, Zambia. Having been out of the area for 10 years was amazed at how few people I still knew in town but enjoyed being close to family and making new friends. As luck would have it, some 'political glitches' prevailed and I never did make it to Africa (too bad, as it was safe in those days) and therefore found myself asking "What is an Agronomist going to do in upstate NY?" There was this thing called 'the Yellow Pages' then where I found the Harris Seed Co., a well-established and well-respected, worldwide producer of flower and vegetable seeds. My work there was very rewarding as I had the opportunity to work with a plant breeder building genetic bridges to develop disease resistance into cucurbits (melons/squash, etc.) As in all industries, there were mergers and acquisitions so at the end of ten years, all research was transferred to the west coast where the major agricultural producers and seed companies now existed. I am very much a west-coast minded gal, but at the time I had met my, now, husband who had a 10-year-old son and there was no way we were going to separate him from his mother and family here, so I passed on the transfer



and went to work for a sports marketing company in NYC (an easy commute

from Rochester) for the next 10 years. Talk about a lifestyle change! WOW. But it was a great career builder and paved the way to meeting extraordinary

people from all over the country and making lifelong friends.

Remember what I said about mergers and acquisitions? Round two ensued and after seeing this company go through four ownership changes, each less appealing than the last, I called it quits.

Remember what I said about lifelong friends? One day I had lunch with a friend who handed me a magazine that he was consulting for, circled the publishers name and said "call – I think it's a good fit.' So I met this guy that had a good idea and a good product and had just started to franchise his business. I bought the franchise to publish the New England edition of what soon became a national publication about career exploration, college planning and life skills for high school students. Education always being near and dear to my heart and roots in New England—it made sense. And guess what? If you are still paying attention: it lasted for 10 years.

Somewhere pretty close to the beginning of that span, I was diagnosed with bilateral Meniere's Disease which is a debilitating, depressing, anxiety ridden condition with a distinctive hearing loss pattern. I had to stop skiing, playing tennis and basically all outside activity; travel became increasingly difficult and I pretty much fell out of any social obligations/interactions because it was too embarrassing when the episodes hit--most always without notice. Plus I needed all of my energy to keep the magazine afloat. All I did during this time was work.



Then one day at the Tennis Club of Rochester I ran into my dear friend **Vern Thayer**, who introduced to me to HLAA (then SHHH). That was

somewhere around 2001--Vern can probably tell you exactly when it was! I attended a few meetings when in town. The programs were always interesting and it was so relaxing to be around these friendly, inviting, warm people that couldn't hear either. Somehow we managed with ease. It was a sanctuary of sorts.

In 2010 I sold the franchise and planned to move to Cincinnati where my husband had taken a job offer he could not refuse. At the same time my mother's rare form of cancer returned, was deemed terminal, with no idea how long she would live.

My priorities changed overnight. Shelby (our four-legged girl) and I stayed in Rochester to help Mom, while Bill did what he had to do. As part and parcel of my 'maintenance' routine, I started attending more HLAA programs and have been actively participating in our chapter since.

We have an ambitious plan going forward, but I know there is a core of caring, competent, dedicated, passionate and compassionate people in this organization, and we are going to not only continue its legacy of giving but expand the ways we can help the community at large in our mission to 'open the world of communication to people with hearing loss by providing information, education, support, and advocacy.' If you are reading this, most likely you or someone you know has a hearing loss. Please join us in our mission: get involved, come to programs, visit our website, and/or share your story.

I look forward to meeting and getting to know many more of you. Please know that our doors and minds are always open for ideas, information, suggestions and each other.

HLAA ANNUAL CONVENTION

Washington DC - June 22-26, 2016 By Elise de Papp, M.D.



An amazing number of 21 of us attended the convention--an exceptionally inspirational gathering. At the Award breakfast Sunday morning many

members were honored, including our President **Cindy Kellner** who received the "Spirit of HLAA" award. Other recipients included the NYC policeman fired because he needed hearing aids, secondary to on-duty work, and fought the powers to be in NYC for 5 years before he was reinstated to duty--an amazing story of courage and fortitude.

State and chapter workshops started off the meetings, followed by plenary sessions. A highlight was PCAST, President's report from the National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine, focused on Hearing Health Care for Adults, emphasizing HL as a public health priority. Others included The Federal Communications Commission about the latest accessible communication.

The schedule is divided into tracks/workshops, including Advocacy; Assistive technology and large area systems; Hearing aids and CI's; Living your life; and, State chapter development. You can find just about any topic that interests you or that you'd like to learn more about. Every meeting room has a loop plus captions and interpreters. Demo and experience rooms were available for specifics, such as the Roger Pen, which many in our chapter got to try this past year, courtesy of Phonak.

Friday morning was the NY State breakfast. Then the research symposium--a highlight of the convention--developing drugs for sensorineural hearing loss and gene therapy; stem cell therapy--all a work in progress. Three speakers spoke about aural rehabilitation, providing care "out of the box" – going to where the need is, and encouraging people who can't afford hearing aids to try over-the-

counter technologies, such as personal sound amplifiers.

The exhibition hall was almost filled with vendors—you could have spent 100% of the time there. Friday evening, at least 6 buses took us on the evening "tour of lighted monuments." Saturday evening's banquet included laughs from Gael Hannan and mind-twisting games by Max the magician/mentalist.

Our experiences at Convention will be the topic of the Chapter meetings October 4th. We hope to see you then.


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
