We continue to refine our monthly Zoom sessions, and are offering some special 'classes'; first on **Speechreading** in March and April and now, this month, **Hearing Aids for Beginners** And don't forget the printed **Communication's Guide** for healthcare visits we published in our March issue.

We will be planning the content of our Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 offerings in June – and we invite your ideas of subject matter relevant to your needs.

Reorganization...

Those of us in the back room, so it speak, are tackling the long vexing question of how to better manage HLAA-Rochester more efficiently into the future. Over the years our current Organization List using the Board, President, Vice-president model has evolved into a three-page patchwork of committees and hard-working volunteers. It requires coordination issue-by-issue and generates a barrage of emails as 'Reply All' is generously used.

A new Organization Chart has been approved by the Board. It retains the Board, President and Vicepresident but then splits responsibilities into four targeted Divisions. align the organization to better respond to the needs of our supporters and friends. Also, to address new developments by working within a structure having clearly defined roles. Communication will be better targeted, and volunteers will be able to concentrate on their area of expertise.

Once we can again meet in-person we plan to simulcast sessions on Zoom, continue our effort to reach out locally and beyond; also improve our effort to address supporter and friends needs and concerns. This will increase our workload calling for more volunteers willing to contribute their time and talent. At the same time, we hope the new organizational structure will keep the workload commitment of our current supporters at manageable levels. It will also keep HLAA-Rochester viable into the future.

What about Tech?

The Technology Team is introducing a new **Express Hearing Check Kiosk.** A free 5-minute hearing check. Probably the first in the United States, it demonstrates to an individual how he/she hears now versus how he/she could hear with hearing aid or assistive device correction. We're excited about this because it targets the individual's degree of hearing loss to provide a live demonstration. (Please see the Express Hearing Check Kiosk article on page 6.)

Our **Virtual Demo Center** on **hearinglossrochester.org** has been enhanced making searches easier. And on a continuing basis new products are included.

With the advent of over-the-counter (OTC) aids coming in 2022, there is already a constant flow of new devices advertised in print and on social media as hearing aids. Buyer Beware!

New Course ... Hearing Aids for Beginners

For anyone thinking about getting hearing aids or for those who recently received hearing aids for the first time, HLAA-Rochester will offer a short course of two session on Zoom.

Each will be at 10:00 AM on Thursdays, May 6^{th} and May 13^{th} . The sessions will be 60 - 90 minutes, led by a retired audiologist who is also a hearing aid user.

The first session will cover how to decide where to go and what to look for – and, importantly, what to look-out for. The second session will cover reasonable expectations for new users and some issues and problems that users should never have to put up with.

The content will not be commercialized in any way and will not recommend or endorse any products or providers. The purpose of HLAA is to serve as a resource for people with hearing loss of all levels and to provide information, educational opportunities, and personal support as needed. cago area hospitals has enhanced communication between staff and hearing disabled patients. Their "Panel discussion on hospital safety for people with hearing loss" began in 2014 with a group of four hospital representatives. Repeated annually, the program underwent struggles but has yielded positive results, with both HLAA members and hospital staff learning from each other. It has evolved over the years as hearing disabled individuals learned to advocate for themselves.

Elaine will suggest outreach approaches to encourage Finger Lakes health care centers to join HLAA in augmenting patients' hospital experiences. If it works in Chicago, it could work in Rochester, she contends.

Serving on the Board of Directors of HLAA national organization, Elaine also is president of the Chicago North Shore chapter. Although her mild to moderate hearing loss was diagnosed when she was 19, she was not fitted with hearing aids until she was 32. Before retiring she practiced law as a sole practitioner in the field of estate planning, probate and estate administration.

Thursday, May 6 and Thursday May 13, 10:00am: Joseph Kozelsky CCC/A. Hearing Aids for Beginners

Hearing aids are difficult for people to buy because of their high cost, no brand recognition, and doubt whether hearing aids will work for them. This dual session tutorial aims to guide newcomers on their hearing loss journeys.

The May 6 session introduces new hearing aid consumers to "important things" like what to look for and what to look out for, when considering purchasing a hearing aid. The follow-up on May 13 covers "reasonable expectations" based on reports of helpfulness and frustrations experienced by new hearing aid users.

Each session begins with a question and answer period followed by some information about hearing aids and then opportunity for more questions.

Joseph Kozelsky CCC/A is a retired audiologist formerly in private practice who uses hearing aids. He also facilitates HOPE, see below.

Thursday, May 11, 10:00am: Joseph Kozelsky CCC/A. Hearing Other People's Experiences (HOPE) You are not alone as a person with hearing

loss! Prospective, new, or experienced hearing aid users are invited to share their experiences, questions, and hearing loss journeys in an informal virtual round table discussion facilitated by Joe Kozelsky, a retired audiologist and hearing aid user. Real hearing aid users discuss real problems and concerns.

Thursday May 20, 10:00 am: Virtual ALD Demo Center. HLAA Rochester Technology Team.

This is a continuing orientation to the on-line "Virtual Demo Center" web site. It is a review of selected assistive listening devices, captioningcapable and amplified telephones, signaling-alerting devices and smart phone APP's related to hearing enhancement and gives the opportunity for the presenters to answer questions from those joining the Zoom meeting.

My Story - Pin Tschang An interesting, but unspectacular narrative.

I was born in Penang, Malaysia and my career took me to the Kodak Research Labs. I retired in 1990. My wife, Shirley, is a retired R.N. I enjoy classical music.



Eons ago, one morning in bed, I

suddenly found myself with no hearing in my right ear which was disturbing as I was always conscious of my stereophonic hearing when listening to classical music. So, I soon visited an ENT doctor (not sure if a surgeon) in East Orange, NJ which is a good neighborhood town. The doctor put me in a darkened room with one dim light bulb and examined the ear. Since that was in the early 60's, my memory today is vague as to what kind of hearing test (a tuning fork?) he gave me but I am quite certain if he used any instrument at all, it wasn't any like what an audiologist would use today. Anyway, he said he couldn't find anything wrong with the ear and questioned if I was sure I ever had hearing in that right ear. I probably gave him a resounding yes. He was ready to let me go but asked at the last moment if I wanted to book another appointment to see him. I was taken aback but don't quite recall my exact response.

We lived then on the Jersey side of the George Washington Bridge in a five story apartment with a, not breathtaking, small window view of Manhattan. I could literally jump on the bridge, pay the toll with a 25 cent ticket and drive unimpeded down the West Side Highway to my work in the Electronic Research Lab of Columbia University on West 125th Street, and into the parking ramp in around 15 minutes! Those were the days. I couldn't resist this detour; but back to my ear. One story above us was this Irish-Italian couple, friends of ours, and the wife, so happened, just had a successful stapedectomy done to her by one Dr. John Daly of the NYU Medical Center purportedly the pioneer of this technique. So, in short order, an appointment was made, and the operation was performed by Dr. Daly and his student(s)? I say this because I saw him at the start of the job and woke up at the end. I was told later that I was supposed to be under only local anesthesia. Naturally I was grateful that the hearing was restored to just below 10db of the good ear. In retrospect, I wonder why at that relatively young age, I had this sclerotic disease of the ear and that reminds me of an incidence which, I think, happened to this ear: Our oldest daughter, around 2 or 3

years old before my hearing loss, was an inquisitive little girl and I woke up one morning and found a screw that she had removed from our alarm clock, in my ear! Could that be the cause?

65 years later, we are in Rochester and after using an over-the-counter ear wax cleaner (bad move) I noticed significant hearing loss in my good left ear that led me to an ENT doctor who sucked out big pieces of wax and let me go, incredibly, without further checking. My hearing wasn't any better and a while later I saw another ENT doctor (recommended by our HLAA chapter). After being tested by this audiologist, it was confirmed both ears have moderate loss but in somewhat different regions. Since the last doctor left the question of a hearing aid up to me, I invested \$200 on a Bellman & Symfon pocket size amplifier that came with a pair of earphones as output device and volume and treble boost. The built-in non directional microphone works fine but the T-Coil feature I have yet to find a place to see how it works. It came also with an electric cable allowing direct connection to either a TV or PC and that is good, as it turned out, with or without the amplifier. The amplifier runs on two AA batteries and seems to last forever (several weeks?). That's good but the 5 1/2"x1 3/4"x1"size is a bit bulky so I decided to look into one of those cashew nut looking miniaturized hearing aids riding on the ears. First, our friend highly recommended a \$400 MdHearingAid online that was said to be as good as her \$5000 pair. We sent for it and it came with too short stems to reach into my ears. A call to them revealed that they couldn't supply longer stems. At a cost of paying \$25 for shipping back, the refund duly arrived. In the meantime, untold numbers of pop-up ads from them appeared on my PC when I went online. It was quite a pain.

Finally, I bit the bullet and eventually bought an Oticon pair from HearingAidWorks. According to Dr. Carolynne Pouliot, her after-visits are free and unlimited. My Oticons work fine although the Tinnitus curing setting thus far has not worked on me. On the whole, they have worked out fine even though the high-end compensation could probably be turned down a bit to avoid the tinny hearing on some occasions.

This is the up-to-date story of my moderate hearing loss. I conclude that I can survive with (1) a REAL hearing aid, (2) an amplifier, (3) earphones to TV/PC, or (4) asking the speaker to speak louder. By the way, my wife has three old-age cousins in China with hearing loss and they never went

Summer Hear For You Program to be **Offered at Nazareth College**

The Nazareth College Hearing Clinic will be offering their Hear For You program online through Zoom this summer. Hear for You is a program for adults with hearing loss who use hearing aids or cochlear implants. The Hear For You group sessions help participants better understand their own hearing loss and the challenges that they may experience as a result of their hearing loss. Participants also learn and practice techniques and strategies for improving their communication with family, friends, and others. Topics include communication strategies, problem-solving, speechreading skills, clarification skills, and assistive technology.

The *Hear For You* group sessions are facilitated by Master's students in Speech-Language Pathology and a licensed and credentialed audiologist from Nazareth College. This summer's *Hear For You* program will occur on Wednesday evenings from 6:30-8:00 p.m. from May 26 to June 23. There is no cost to participate.

higher than the good old amplifier.

I discovered HLAA through LifeSpan about 2-3 years ago when we visited the equipment demo there and we have been impressed by the dedicated service ever since.



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Express Hearing Check Kiosk

Our chapter has acquired a new product, the Express Hearing Check Kiosk, which guides the user through a set of simple steps to discover their own hearing profile. The device is made by Alango Technologies under the Wear&Hear product line.

The visitor walks up to the self-service kiosk, puts on over-the-ear headphones that are connected to the Kiosk, and presses the 'Get Started' button on the device's touchscreen. A series of tones of increasing frequencies are then played, one ear at a time.

For each tone, the user adjusts a slider on the touchscreen to set the volume to their hearing threshold. At the end of the process, the user's screening audiogram is produced and displayed as a graph accompanied by short, explanatory text. At a glance, the user is able to see if they have a hearing loss, and if so, to what degree.

But the hearing check does not end there. What sets the Kiosk apart from a simple hearing screening is the playback of a previously recorded speech sample that lets the visitor switch between audio without any hearing loss compensation and audio that is customized to the user's screening audiogram.

As we all know, words alone are not enough to convince someone to seek help for their hearing loss.

You can "Attend" Other Chapter's Meetings

HLAA Chapters and State Organizations have been transitioning their in-person meetings to virtual meetings online during the pandemic. You are welcome to visit online HLAA Chapter and State Organizations meetings from all across the country. They are listed in one central calendar from the HLAA Leaders List Groups.io calendar.

First, go to **hearingloss.org.** There is a new purple calendar option in the upper menu bar. After you click on it, a new window will open. Click on the purple FIND HLAA CHAPTER MEETINGS HERE button to access the HLAA Leaders Groups.io calendar. This button is also on the Find A Chapter page on the HLAA website as well. The often-quoted seven-plus years that someone waits, on average, to seek help confirms that claim. However, if the person is able to actually <u>experi-</u><u>ence</u> much-improved hearing, further words are unnecessary.

We are optimistic that this self-administered hearing check and audio demonstration will finally convince

many hard-of-hearing people to schedule an appointment with an audiologist or at least investigate assistive listening devices (ALDs). Our recommendation, as always, is to see a hearing professional first. If hearing aids are necessary, then possibly consider adding an ALD for especially difficult hearing situations.

Our chapter's ALD Demo Center product lineup has included two headsets from

Wear&Hear that implement the same basic hearing technology used in the self-check kiosk, but which are configured as consumer ALDs. They are the BeHear NOW and BeHear ACCESS headsets.

When the Demo Center opens again, hopefully soon, we invite you to stop by to experience the Express Hearing Check Kiosk, the ALD headsets, and the other devices on display.

More than 48 million people in the US have a hearing loss, which can hinder daily communication. By age 65, one in three Americans has a hearing loss.
